BBC Breathing Places Grant - Update.

A successful grant bid put together by Chris and Craig gave the Friends of Ogden Water a sum of £9750 from the BBC Breathing Places scheme. As the deadline for completing the project fast approaches (July 31st), spending the money has been a priority (if its not spent - we have to give it back!!) and works have gathered momentum in true Ogden fashion....

The projects....

The project has so far helped build some wild flower planters, plant a small wildflower meadow and purchase a top specification wireless bird box camera system (more on this elsewhere). However, the main source of expenditure is directed at the restoration of one of the Ogden Water ponds so that it is a better wildlife habitat and suited more to use by visiting groups for pond dipping.

The pond.

The pond works have been carried out on the existing pond alongside the reservoir. This had become choked with woodrush and had very limited wildlife value. This is because it is fed by a stream which picks up cold water from the surrounding moorland, providing it with a consistent flow. Unfortunately, this also meant that the water body is too mobile and pond temperatures never rise high enough to encourage aquatic invertebrates to inhabit it.



The solutions.

This project aims to divert the majority of the water flow around the stream, allowing the water to stand and warm up. A sluice system will allow the pond to be topped up whenever necessary. In addition, excavation will landscape the two sections of pond into one larger area of water and remove the dominating rushes. Iris, marsh marigolds and other welcome species of aquatic plant will be removed by hand for re-introduction when the project is completed.



Access and Education.

Accompanying these habitat improvements, access will be made better for schools and community groups to take advantage of the pond for dipping activities. This will include installation of a dipping platform, with access for wheelchairs. Interpretation panels will be installed providing information about the different habitats and wildlife. To finish the project, nets, identification booklets and hand lenses will be bought for groups to use.

Ogden Wildlife Cam goes LIVE!

The new Ogden Wildlife Camera is a fantastic addition to the awesome array of technology now used at Ogden Water. Paid for by the BBC Breathing Places grant, the wildlife camera has been resident in a nest box inhabited by a family of blue tits. With live pictures being transmitted back to the Visitor Centre, visitors could enjoy the unfolding documentary about blue tit family life on television. Of the 12 eggs laid, 8 chicks successfully went on to fledge and leave the nest box.



How many blue-tits?

With the box now empty, the wildlife camera is looking for a new location and new subjects to watch. One option being considered is to mount it near a bird table, broadcasting close-up pictures of birds back to the Visitor Centre.

When its back in action, the wildlife camera will also be used to feed pictures onto the internet. The link is in place - just keep an eye on the ogdenwater.org.uk website for further details.

Wildlife News.

As summer is now here (?), eyes are once again turning towards the moors in search of adders. Last year they caused quite a stir when spotted sun bathing on the golf course.

This year, a small scale monitoing project is underway at Ogden. Small corrugated sheets have been placed around the estate in sheltered, sunny spots. It is hoped these may attract any adders as they look for suitable places to catch some warmth. The corrugated sheets are checked visually by looking on the tops and also very carefully lifting them to see what lurks underneath. Although no adders have been seen on them, Chris has got a couple of excellent shots of lizards he found underneath.

Regular visitor Terry Cambell took this superb photo one morning, whilst out walking his dog. There has been an established population of Tawny Owls at Ogden for many years - Tawny Owls are territorial and will range over the same area for many years. Ten out of ten to Terry for snapping one of these shy birds at roost during the early morning hours.

Tawny Owl facts. Things you might not know about the Tawny Owl!

Scientific name: Syrix aluca

This is the most common and widespread owl in Europe with around 50-100,000 pairs in Britain.

The tawny owl is the biggest common owl in the UK, about the size of a pigeon. The females weigh more than the males.

Male and female tawny owls bond for life.

The tawny owl is nocturnal and therefore not often seen in daylight.

They hunt and eat small mammals, plus small birds, insects, worms or frogs.

Tawny owls have exceptionally good hearing: they usually detect their prey by the tiny rustling sounds small rodents make as they move around.

Their feathers are very soft, so the owl makes no sound as it flies.

Ovenden Moor Wind Farm Re-powering

Love them or hate them, the wind turbines above Ogden Water have very much been a part of the landscape for the past 15 years. Although still giving reasonable performance, E.ON are investigating the feasibility of replacing the existing turbines with modern units - a process known as re-powering.

Planning permission for the project will be submitted to the Council later this year, after consultancy and necessary surveys have been carried out. The re-powering will reduce the number of turbines to 10 (there are 23 at the moment), but instead of standing 49 metres tall to the tip as they are now, they will be 115metres tall. These 10 turbines would increase the output from 9.2 MW to 20MW and extend the life of the windfarm as a feature on the landscape for another 20 years.
